Thank you for helping to trap the cats!

Here are a few simple things to keep in mind so that the process goes smoothly, safely, and humanely.



Know The Plan:

Keep Cool:

- Keep traps out of the sun and bright light. <u>PLAN AHEAD</u> as the sun shifts!
- Animals can overheat quickly and suffer other medical conditions.
- Bright light causes significantly more stress.



Stay Nearby:

- NEVER leave a trap unattended for long periods, and check regularly.
- Trapped cats are vulnerable; you are responsible for keeping them safe.
- A trapped cat may be injured or become agitated, and even move the trap.
- Among many things, animals can come by, and cats can get covered with ants.



Cover the Trap:

- If not already covered, cover the trap IMMEDIATELY once the cat is trapped.
- Covering the trap keeps cats calm and prevents stress and injury.
- Leave no space where the cat can see out.



Keep Protected:

- Keep the trap away from sprinklers, loud noises, children, dogs and other pets.
- Insure that the trap is not accessible to other animals, especially coyotes, raccoons and other feral cats.



Leave Closed:

- Once a cat is trapped <u>DO NOT OPEN</u> the trap door except in an emergency!
- Do not attempt to handle, pet, remove, or transfer a cat in a trap.
- Do not add/change food or water unless directed to do so and shown how.



Interlopers:

- Sometimes wildlife and other cats will get unintentionally trapped.
- These animals need to be released as soon as possible. <u>IF</u> you feel comfortable, open the door to let them out. Wear gloves and watch your fingers!
- OTHERWISE, contact your primary contact or Animal Control for assistance.
